

Help for parents of sexually abused children

In our last newsletter, we told you about a new service the GCCAC is offering to parents of children affected by sexual abuse. Thanks to the Swalm Family Foundation, we were awarded a grant to develop and distribute a workbook to help parents navigate life after learning of their child's disclosure of sexual abuse. The workbook discusses several topics that affect children and families subjected to sexual abuse. Also included in the workbook are activities that parents can complete on their own or with their children to help foster open and supportive communication.

The GCCAC and partnering CAC's collectively distributed over 130 workbooks to non-offending caregivers in 2013. Initial data collected prior to receiving a workbook showed

lower rates of confidence in their abilities to move forward. Participating non-offending caregivers were asked questions after completing the workbook, and data shows the workbook helped reduce their levels of fear and anxiety as well as help boost their confidence in their abilities as a caregiver to move forward. Over 60% of the participating non-offending caregivers involved their children in the activities throughout the workbook.

Data collected after completing the workbook showed it was helpful to the participating parents and their families. When asked how the workbook was helpful, one parent explained, "It helped me understand what was being told to me. It was like reading a textbook; it (sexual abuse) was something that I never thought would happen to us and that it happens a lot more often." Another parent told the GCCAC the workbook helped them "...cope and let them know their feelings were normal." Other parents stated the workbook helped them to better communicate with their children and provided insight on how to deal with abuse and neglect.

Overall, the workbook accomplished the goal we set out to achieve. The GCCAC will continue to offer the workbook to parents of children affected by sexual abuse. We look forward to receiving continuing feedback from parents to ensure the workbook remains a helpful instrument in their recovery from the effects of child sexual abuse.



With our first decade behind us, we have certainly learned many very valuable lessons, helped numerous families, educated the community about abuse and neglect, seen justice through the court system, conducted more than 2,900 forensic interviews, provided thousands of free counseling hours, and facilitated a team approach to child abuse investigations in Guadalupe County. Now what?! Well... unfortunately, child abuse hasn't stopped happening in our community, but fortunately, the GCCAC is here to stay to serve those affected by abuse and neglect.
